Did you know...

Douglas MacArthur - A five-star general in the United States Army, Brother Douglas supervised the occupation of Japan during World War II as supreme commander of the Allied Forces in the Pacific.

Franklin D. Roosevelt - As the 32nd President of the United States, he led the nation through the Great Depression and World War II, enacting the New Deal and establishing the United Nations. He was a member of Holland Lodge #8 in New York, New York.

Harry S. Truman was the 33rd President of the United States and played a crucial role in the Allies' victory in World War II. Brother Harry was a member of Missouri's Belton Lodge No. 450.

I've come to the understanding that this is the ritual light that Brothers see us in and hopefully we continue to shine brightly individually and as a whole.
